## Pharmacy in a Box

The other day I was waiting in line at my local CVS Pharmacy and was feeling annoyed. Annoyed that the line was so long. Then annoyed that both of my prescriptions were not ready, only one. While waiting for my second prescription to be filled I wandered the aisles near the pharmacy coun-

ter. I saw that anti-fungal cream was on sale and became excited. Not because I have a bad case of athlete's foot, but because it is something we can use at the clinic in Haiti. Suddenly, I didn't feel so annoyed anymore. Here I was, standing in a large store, mere minutes from my home, that was filled with endless medications to cure any ailment I may have and aid in living a healthier life. I thought back to my last trip to Haiti when we did a mobile clinic up in the mountains. Myself and another volunteer were struggling to carry "the pharmacy" up a rather steep hill when a kind Haitian man came out from his home, grabbed our box, placed it on his shoulders, and carried it the rest of the way to the church made of palm fronds and a tin roof that was to be our clinic for the day. When our mobile clinic runs out of medication that's it - there is no going back to the supply room for more. Our pharmacy, both at the main clinic and our mobile clinics, is where people come to mostly get things that we can buy over the counter here in the United States: aspirin, fungal cream, Tylenol, etc. Imagine having to see your doctor every time you wanted to take an Advil for a headache? When I heard my name called over the CVS speaker that my prescription was ready, I headed back to the counter, fungal creams in hand, now happy at the thought of sending some needed medications to Haiti! If you find yourself at your local pharmacy wandering the aisles and seeing a good sale please considering donating to our clinic. We are always accepting the following medications:

I was in my home in Port-au-Prince when the earthquake hit. The first most painful thoughts were my family. Where is my daughter, my siblings, and my mom? Are they ok. Telephone communications were very difficult; hence, I was unable to reach them. Sebatien found me the morning after it struck. He took me, along with several others, back to Montrouis with him. I only stayed a few days because it was too painful to not know what happened to my family. My home was one of the few undamaged. I found my daughter and siblings, but my mom was not found yet. She was near the epicenter. She walked as far as she could to get to Port-au-Prince to find us, her children. When she could no longer walk, a man lent her his phone. She was finally able to reach one of my siblings. We picked her up to bring her back to us.

It is very difficult to say something positive occurred from the earthquake. So many lives were lost. My heart is still broken. The one thing that came of it was my involvement with Life Connection Mission. Sebatien and I have been friends since childhood. He asked for my help with the mission here and there and then for a longer period as his right hand man. Working with Life Connection Mission has been an honor. Helping the innocent children has been a light in my life.

## **Remembering & Honoring...**

The day of the earthquake started off as an exciting day. Peggy was coming to visit for several weeks, our relationship was young at the time. I picked her up from the airport, ran a few errands, and returned to Montrouis. I was helping Peggy settle in when the earthquake hit. I didn't realize the gravity of it until later that night. Who could possibly imagine their "White House" collapsing. It was unimaginable that our Palace dropped to the ground like a pancake. My father, Jean, and I left Montrouis at 5am the next morning to find people we and oth-



ers working for the mission knew. We brought back as many people as we could. That afternoon, I went back to Port-au-Prince with as much water as I could carry in the truck. We made multiple trips for days. We brought sixty-three people back to stay across the street at the clinic. We supported over four hundred people sleeping at the Life Connection Mission School. A camp was set up on land that Dr. J had purchased by the public beach. We built a shower and provided food. Many people related to families we knew and trusted had relatives staying with them; we helped support them too. There is no positive to the earthquake, but being the director of Life Connection Mission allowed me to help so many people. We made several trips to Port-au-Prince giving as much water as we could afford to buy, emptying our supply of clothes, and providing hope. We prayed with people everywhere we went. On the afternoon of January 12, 2010, a magnitude 7.0 earthquake struck Haiti. It was one more disaster in a country that has suffered from decades of political, economical, social setbacks, and inequalities.

With approximately three million people affected, the earthquake was the most devastating natural disaster ever experienced in Haiti. Roughly 300,000 lives were lost, and 300,0000 people were injured. About 1.5 million individuals were forced to live in makeshift displaced person camps. As a result, the country faced the greatest humanitarian need in its history.

2018: While progress has been made, some of the issues prior to the earthquake persist in Haiti, such as weak political governance, lack of infrastructure, and limited access to basic resources.

2019: In March, opposition parties block a vote to ratify a new prime minister effectively shutting down the government and calling for President Moise to resign. By fall, widespread antigovernment protests have shutdown schools, businesses, and have worsened humanitarian needs. Today, with nearly sixty percent living below the poverty line, many children are hungry. In fact, half of all Haitians are undernourished and 100.000 under five suffer from acute mal nutrition.

The nightmare that Haiti no longer wants to relive.

Already 10 years since a terrible earthquake took away almost everything. The 2010 earthquake devastated the country enormously in terms of materials damage and loss of human lives. Most of us have been affected in one way or another by this tragedy. We have seen more than 300 thousand people leaving for the after-life. These people were our children, our fathers, our mothers, our friends, our work colleagues, our classmates, etc. In fact, we have all somehow lost a loved one to ourselves.

Myself, having survived this drama, I give thanks to God and honor the memory of all those who did not have the chance to survive it. And I believe that if I am still alive, there is certainly a good reason for that. I believe that my mission was not





yet coming to an end and God still wanted me on this earth in order to be able to serve the most underprivileged. And 10 years later, I am here at Life Connection Mission, working for the well-being of others whom I consider to be the most exciting job of my life. The 2010 earthquake struck us, of course. But, it also impacted our lives in positive ways. It allowed us to retrospect in order to be able to correct our mistakes made in the past and set better goals for the future. Life Connection Mission always knew how to set big goals and tried to achieve them. Its most recent projects date back to the construction of a trade school a much

construction of a trade school, a much

more spacious kitchen and a sports field. None of this would be possible without the continued support of our dear donors. Thank you to all of you for supporting our projects. I hope brighter days for the future. I am dreaming of Life Connection Mission supporting other schools in the community by providing school materials as it is with the Mission school.
